The goal of this clinic is to learn how to integrate research into practice. Starting with what we already know and do through collaborative teacher inquiry, we will explore strategies and tools for assessing the outcomes and impact of the school library learning commons program. Through a hands-on approach, we will learn the basics of research: ethics, collecting and analyzing qualitative and quantitative data and reporting findings, using real data from the DDSB project, *Creating 21c Library Learning Commons Spaces*. By the end of the day, the DDSB will have everything it needs to "write up" their research, and we will all leave with a deeper understanding of how we can integrate research into practice, and enrich professional knowledge into school library learning commons practice in Canada.

Kimberly Silk is a librarian with a background in academic and data librarianship and a passion for conducting research to evaluate how libraries impact their communities.

She is co-author of "<u>So Much More: The Economic Impact of Toronto Public Library on the City of Toronto</u>," published in 2013 and the first library economic impact study of its kind in Canada. As Principal Consultant of <u>BrightSail Research</u>, she continues to work with public libraries across Canada to extend this methodology. In 2014 she created the <u>Library Research Network</u>, a not-for-profit, curated, web-based repository of research relevant to public, academic, government and special libraries. Her most recent collaboration with Dr. Bill Irwin, "<u>Creating a Culture of Evaluation: Taking Your Library from Talk to Action</u>", was published by OLA Press in April 2017.
